Order of Malta American Association Prison Ministry Recap of 2019 Activities Submitted by Craig Gibson, Chair

American Association Prison Ministry Committee April 2020

We are pleased to present this report of the American Association's 2019 Prison Ministry program. It is based on:

- Information compiled by Craig Gibson, current Chair of the American Association Prison Ministry Committee, who reached out to Area Chairs to confirm active Prison Ministry programs and obtain updates;
- Input from Dr. Robert J. Fredericks who, up until the end of 2019, was Chair of the American Association Prison Ministry Committee.

Within the American Association, more than 185 Order of Malta regular members and 115 Auxiliary members participate in a wide range of programs. More than 28 hands-on Prison Ministry programs take place in 13 Areas. Programs include:

- *Rehabilitation*. Rehabilitation programs include the annual distribution of 12,000 Bibles in English and 6,000 in Spanish. Similar numbers of Prayer Books and Prayer Cards are also distributed. Fifty-five thousand copies of *The Serving Brother* newsletter are widely distributed quarterly as well.
- *Visitation*. Our volunteers visit men and women in many jails and prisons, encouraging spiritual growth through attendance of religious services and Bible-study groups.
- *Pen Pal Program*. More than 50 regular Order of Malta members from the American Association take part in this program. Additionally, over 50 Auxiliary members participate.
- **Programs for Families**. These programs reach hundreds through mentoring children of the incarcerated, providing transportation for visits, wrapping and distributing Christmas gifts and assisting in various centers that support families affected by incarceration.
- *Re-entry Programs*. Re-entry programs assist hundreds of recently released individuals through mentoring; distributing resource guides of available social services for those in need; and providing housing, meals, medical support, education services and job placement in designated caring centers. Dismas Home is an example.
- *Rosary Petition*. This is a program where inmates gather together every evening to pray the Rosary using a printable card, and they recite a common Rosary petition. While the program is new, inmates at many facilities are participating.

This report would not be complete without a big thank you to **Dr. Robert J. Fredericks** for his leadership, both in starting Prison Ministry for the American Association and continuing to guide it over the past 15 years. His commitment has been central to the program's success. His legacy is one of helping countless prisoners to reconnect to Christ and of supporting the many Area Coordinators as well as regular and auxiliary members in this critical work. While Bob is stepping down as Chair, he is continuing Prison Ministry work, including providing oversight of the Bible and Prayer Book distribution program.

This gave her so much hope, so thank you to whoever has made this possible.
