Information Guide for Prospective Volunteers



Overview: Kolbe Prison Ministries ("KPM") is a Texas 501(c)(3) charitable organization (IRS Tax ID 47-5446694). KPM is entirely a "volunteer only" organization with no paid staff and minimal overhead. KPM began presenting retreats in 2009 in Texas State prisons, was incorporated as a legal entity in 2015, and approved by the IRS as a tax-exempt nonprofit in 2017. Kolbe Prison Ministries is named for St. Maximilian Kolbe, a renowned Polish priest who was martyred at the Auschwitz death camp during World War II. KPM's mission is "To share the agape love of Jesus Christ with those in prison and to teach the fullness of the truth of the Catholic Church to the incarcerated." We carry out this mission by volunteers presenting a three-day retreat to inmates within the prison walls followed by ongoing faith-based education and formation. We are led by God's call in Matthew 25:36 ("I was in prison and you visited me") to minister to the imprisoned. This ministry, through corporal works of mercy, has enriched and reinvigorated the spiritual lives of many thousands of inmates. KPM does not proselytize but rather inspires retreatants to grow in faith, service and love of neighbor. More info on KPM can be found on our website at: kolbeprisonministries.org

Program: KPM ministers to men and women "retreatant" inmates (men serve men and women serve women) who spend 3 full days attending retreats with KPM volunteers. Inmates of all faith (or no faith) backgrounds are welcome to attend KPM retreats. These retreats involve close interaction with an average of 40-66 retreatant inmates and include fellowship, good food, Christian music, heartfelt talks and testimonials, comradery, religious activities and more. KPM has presented a total of 400+ retreats at 75 prisons to over 18,000 inmates. KPM expanded into Louisiana (2018), Florida (2023), Oklahoma and Kansas (2024). In 2024 alone, over 1,000 KPM volunteers presented 60 retreats at 55 different incarcerations facilities across 5 states, to more than 3,000 inmates. At those retreats, KPM volunteers provided about 60,000 total hours of service and served approximately 25,000 meals. The KPM retreats are followed up by weekly catechesis including OCIA, Bible studies, and more.





Board of Directors – Brief Bios of Officers

Kerry Johnston, President. Mr. Johnston was born and in St. Paul, Minnesota, and relocated to Texas more than two decades ago. He has an extensive background as a business owner, for-profit executive, non-profit director, fundraising organizer and web developer. Kerry has a bachelor's degree in Geological Engineering and an MBA. While his technical and business education has served him well in his long career in the energy industry, his true passion is to serve God and help others grow in faith. He has also been very involved in pro-life work, Knights of Columbus, ACTS retreats, Bridges To Life, and the Stephen Ministry. He was the recipient of a 2017 Lumen Gentium Award from the Archbishop of San Antonio for his ministry work. Kerry is also the webmaster for KPM.

Jim Murphy, Vice President. Mr. Murphy hails from Houston, Texas and has a rich and diverse background in business, politics, community service and non-profit boards. He attended Strake Jesuit College Preparatory school and has a BA from the University of Texas, Austin. He has extensive experience in the commercial real estate business as President of District Management Services. Jim was a Republican member of the Texas House of Representatives from 2007 to 2009 and again 2011 to 2023, representing District 133 in Harris County. He served as Majority Leader of the Texas House from 2021 to 2023 and was the former chair or member of various Texas House committees, most notably the chairman of the Corrections Committee. After retiring from politics, Jim has been intimately involved in giving back and ministering alongside fellow Catholics through Kolbe Prison Ministries.



His current role as an officer on the KPM Board further exemplifies his dedication to service and helping others.




Road Often Traveled to Reach KPM




Life starts with challenges which may include broken families, fatherlessness, verbal and/or physical abuse, neglect or abandonment, experiencing or witnessing grave violence, deep-seated trauma, PTSD, lack of positive role models, & lack of safety/security.

Often followed by activation of fight-or-flight stress response, underdeveloped neural connections / cognitive abilities / emotional regulation, seeking refuge in the streets, drugs and/or alcohol abuse to numb the pain, dropping out of school, sense of hopelessness, depression, joining gangs for belonging/survival.








Leading to total self-centeredness, few job skills, little economic opportunity, keeping bad company, making wrong choices, committing criminal activities, getting arrested, landing in prison.

After some time behind bars, realizes the desire for something more in life, notices inmates who have strong faith lives, wants what they have, learns about Kolbe Prison Ministries, signs up to attend a retreat.







